




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# No Space to Pray

“The prayers in *this* synagogue are not from the heart. They do not fly up to G-d.  
 They fill the synagogue and leave no **space** for true, real prayer.”

He took them to a small, **simple synagogue**.  
 A few people were there, **praying** with their hearts.
